Kilburn Parish Council



The Parish Council meetings are now being held face to face in the Village Hall with Covid 19 regulations in place. Our next meeting will be held on Monday 6th September at 7pm. Residents and press are welcome to attend, however, due to social distancing and shortage of space, anybody wishing to attend should contact the Clerk.

The PCSO, Mark Worrall attended the meeting held on 12th July to discuss the lack of policing together with anti social behaviour currently being experienced. The problems with speeding vehicles, especially on Ryknield Road & Woodhouse Road were also discussed.

A fence & stile is to be erected on the Pitfields footpath (running alongside the old chip shop) – this will prevent motorbikes and horses accessing the footpath.

Debris continues to be deposited on the footpath on Brickyard Lane. This is illegal 'fly tipping' and the culprit(s) will be reported to Amber Valley Borough Council.

We would like to thank the residents who took part in the recent Community Litter pick. 14 residents took part collecting 10 bags of debris. The Council are to discuss holding another litter pick in the Autumn – details will be advertised on the noticeboards and the PC website.

Dog owners are asked that they only remove 1 bag at a time from the Parish Council's 'poo bag holders'. Some residents are taking a handful at a time – there is a limited supply, therefore, this action prevents other dog owners from using them.

Local people are being invited to have their say on plans to improve bus services in Derbyshire. The County Council is asking for views on a range of possible improvements to bus services in the county.

The strategy places a requirement on the council and bus companies in the area to work together to create a Bus Service Improvement Plan. This will involve developing plans for improving local bus services and encouraging more people to use them.

Some of the possible changes that the council is seeking views on are, better bus stop facilities, greener buses, more flexible services, on-demand services or anything else you can think of to make the service better.

Please take part in the online questionnaire and let them have your views so that together we can improve services in Derbyshire for you.

The consultation is at; derbyshire.gov.uk/busplan and closes on 29th August 2021.

DCC have just launched their new 'All About Fostering' email bulletins. They will guide you through everything you need to know about fostering in Derbyshire in bitesize chunks through a series of six bulletins—each covering a different topic delivered straight to your inbox.

Foster carers from all backgrounds and communities, LGBT+, any ethnicity, race, culture or religion, single or in a relationship, married or civil partnership, any age over 21 are welcome. You can be in work or not, either rent or own your own home.

If you have a spare room and are interested in fostering, the fostering team would love to hear from you. They offer weekly payments, allowances and full training and support.

<u>Kilburn Nature Reserve – An Update</u>

As many of you will be aware the Parish Council have been working hard over the last 6 months to ensure that the Nature Reserve and Memorial Garden is available for all Parishioners to access and get involved in the Nature Reserve.

During this time, a tree survey was commissioned as the forestry which had been installed over time didn't have the sufficient requirements to help all of the trees within the Reserve thrive. With this survey an amount of the trees which had either been planted within the memorial garden or in the nature reserve had to be felled. This was due to disease, stunted growth of that they would not be able to cope with the landscape. Any trees which had to be removed out of the memorial garden will be replaced once the reserve has been completed.

Another process now is for new pathways to be installed. Currently the pathways are marked out and have been sent out to tender to allow hard standing capability for anyone to be able to wander around the reserve.

New gateways have been installed to allow large vehicle access and also better capability for the Nature Reserve.

Additional phases of work are to be processed in the future which include, Planting of a wild flower meadow. Enhancing the stream bank to allow classes/groups to delve into the stream and look at the wonderful nature we have nearby.

If you would like to get involved, please do not hesitate to get in contact with the Parish Clerk. We want this Nature Reserve to be successful and hope that you will join us.

Neighbourhood Watch Update



With the summer months now being with us and crime across the area on the increase, we would recommend that residents utilize the following tips to protect themselves from becoming a victim.

- Always lock your shed, preferably with two 'hasp and staple' locks (one near the top and one near the bottom of the door) or use or an alarmed padlock.
- Secure your rear garden by locking entry gates with a padlock.
- Burglars can use garden tools to break in, so make sure you securely lock away any tools after use.
- Ensure boundary fences are secure and in good condition.
 Spiky plants along garden boundaries are good additional deterrents.
- Gardening equipment should be visibly marked with your postcode and house number this can deter thieves and help police identify the rightful owner.
- Remember to lock your garage door securely.
 Metal 'up and over' doors can be secured with extra locks fitted either side and/ or a floor-mounted locking 'T' bar with a closed shackle padlock.
- Wooden garage doors can be secured with two substantial 'hasps and staple' locks and closed shackle padlocks (your local DIY store can advise on the most secure options).
- Join Neighbourhood Watch to help reduce crime in your local area.
- Make your home look occupied.
- If you're out or going away, ask a trusted neighbour to open and close your curtains for you and pick up mail so it's not in view.
- Ask a neighbour if they do not mind parking their car on your driveway and trimming your garden to make your home look occupied.
- Cut the front and back lawns before you go away and trim any plants that burglars could hide behind.

- Cancel milk and newspaper deliveries.
- Don't advertise that you are going away on social media, such as Facebook,
 Instagram and Twitter.
- Make a habit out of checking that ground floor windows are closed and locked when you go to bed.
- Upstairs windows should be locked when the house is unoccupied.
- Consider fitting window and door alarms to increase security.



Kilburn Village Hall is currently closed due to the Covid19 pandemic. The Hall Management is currently discussing when and how the Hall may be able to open. There will be further notices indicating when this will happen.

101 is now the number to call when you want to contact your local police – when it's less urgent than 999.

When should I call 101?

To report less urgent crime or disorder and for general police enquiries. For example;

- if your car has been stolen;
- if your property has been damaged;
- when you suspect drug use or dealing;
- to report a minor traffic collision;
- to give the police information about crime in your area; or
- if you'd like to speak to your local police officer.

How does it work?

You can call 101 to contact your local police force. The service is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. For more information visit www.police.uk/101

What does it cost me to call?

Calls from landlines and mobile networks cost 15 pence per call, no matter what time of day or how long you are on the phone.

Can I call 101 if I'm deaf, hard of hearing, speech impaired, or if English is not my first language?

Yes, If you are deaf, hard of hearing or speech impaired you can textphone 18001 101. If you have difficulty speaking English, your local police can access interpreters who can translate your call.

Remember, in an emergency always call 999.

For example this is when you need an immediate response because a crime is in progress; someone suspected of a crime is nearby; when there is danger to life or when violence is being used or threatened.
